<p>Sainsbury's - strawberry yoghurt smoothie (250ml), £0,99</p> 	<p>A vivid pink, it looked creamy and had a delicious strawberry smell. Although it struck the right balance between sweet and sour, it reminded me of children's yoghurt. But it was filling and packed with strawberry flavour.</p>
<p>Asda - grape juice with strawberry, banana and guava puree (1litre), £1.94</p> 	<p>Light maroon in colour, this was velvety smooth and easy to drink. It was a good consistency and the mixture of exotic fruit made it a rich but more-ish drink. Although more expensive than the others, the bigger bottle made it good value for money.</p>
<p>Superdrug - the Big J Smoothie Smile blueberry and raspberry (330ml), £1.59</p> 	<p>An unusual blend of juices, this was a tongue-tingling mixture of flavours. A tasty combination of sweet and sour, the raspberry smell was scrummy. Expensive but very close to a made-to-order smoothie.</p>
<p>Marks and Spencer - apple, strawberry, cherry and banana (250ml), £1.50</p> 	<p>An unappetising russet colour, it was runny and sour. It smelt of stewed apples and I couldn't get past the apple flavour either. It was more like a juice than a smoothie and really needs to be thicker.</p>
<p>Morrisons Smoothie-strawberry and banana (1 litre) £1.79</p> 	<p>It looked lush and heavy but was light to drink. And it had tiny bits of fruit which gave it that just-pulped texture. Thick enough for a smoothie but not gooey, it was a lovely blend. Brilliant value for money.</p>

TEEN LIVES ON PB & J SANDWICHES

**WHERE'S THE BEEF? NOT ON BILLY GERMAINE'S PLATE.
NEITHER ARE THE VEGETABLES, POTATOES, CHICKEN OR FISH**

1 This 6-foot-tall, 165-pound, 13-year-old boy has eaten nothing but peanut butter and jelly sandwiches on white bread since he was a baby. The only illness he's ever come down with was a cold at the age of 10. 'I feel great,' says Billy, who's on the high school soccer team in Los Angeles. 'The only thing I wish is that I could eat burgers and fries like my friends. But every time I put anything else but 4 in my mouth, I feel like throwing up. It's been that way ever since I can remember.'

2 Every week, Billy's mom Patty buys five loaves of bread, two 1-pound jars of smooth peanut butter and three jars of grape jelly for her son's big appetite. 'It's a good thing he loves the taste of peanut butter and jelly, otherwise I'd be in real trouble! I've tried everything to get him to eat healthy food like vegetables, chicken and fish, but nothing has worked,' she sighs. 'When Billy was 6, my husband Jim and I signed him up for a program for children with eating disorders at a nearby hospital. After a third session, they

called and said they were sending him home because he kept getting sick to his stomach. He would choke on just one bite of an apple or baked chicken.'

3 Patty first knew that there was something wrong with her son after he got sick on his first bites of solid food as a baby. She experimented with several different dishes, but he refused all of them until, in desperation, she made him a peanut butter and jelly sandwich. A psychologist at the hospital believes Billy suffers from a fear of food, which perhaps was stimulated when his first bite of solid food contained a lump that made him choke.

4 'I've never given up trying to change his eating habits,' says Patty. 'Anyway, Jim and I consulted a nutritionist who told us that Billy's bizarre diet didn't seem to be hurting him at all. She suggested that we give him vitamin supplements, which we do every day. He has to wash the pills down quickly though, with an entire glass of sweetened iced tea before he chokes on them.'




Dear Donna,

THE REAL PRICE OF SHOPLIFTING

IF YOU ARE THINKING HOW EASY IT WOULD BE...THINK AGAIN. A GROWING NUMBER OF SHOPLIFTING TEENS ARE PAYING A HUGE PRICE FOR THEIR CRIME

What started as fun turned into my worst nightmare

1 **Janine Dobby, 16, from Oldham,** hasn't stolen anything since the day she was caught by a



store detective. I started shoplifting as a laugh with my mates. It was just because we were bored. We started off with little things, make-up, sweets, anything you can fit up a sleeve. There were usually four of us, and three would stand around giggling to take the attention away from the one stealing.

2 But the more you get away with it, the more 12 you feel and before long we were going to Manchester for the day and stealing from clothes shops. You just found a top without a tag on it and then wore it under your clothes to walk out of the shop. I got loads of compliments on my new clothes – although I had to hide them from my mum!

3 The day I got caught was the only day I went shoplifting on my own. I put some shampoo in my bag, but then I lost my nerve and walked around the shop for about 15 minutes trying to pluck up the courage to leave. When I did, it was just like your worst nightmare. They wait until you're outside and then they place their hand on your shoulder just as you think you've got away with it.

4 They took me to a little room in the back of the shop and I was crying so much they couldn't get any sense out of me. They said I could either go to the police or ring my mum. I didn't want to call home,

but did because I thought going to the police might have stopped me getting a Saturday job. My mum was very angry. She found all my 'secret' clothes in the bottom of my wardrobe and made me donate them to charity. I'll never do it again.'

I wish I'd never done it

5 **Lucy Metcalf, 16, from Sheffield,**

has lived to regret her shoplifting past - she now has a criminal record. 'There was a lot going on in my life when I started shoplifting. I was having a rough time



at home, which meant I was getting into trouble at school from which I was eventually expelled when I was 13. I got into all sorts of trouble in the year after that. Looking back, I was trying to rebel and get some attention from all the people who didn't understand me – teachers, parents and social workers. It was a cry for help.

6 I was thirteen, out of school, and too young to get a job, so the only way I could get the things I wanted was to steal them. And I had enough time to practise. I went on my own: I think you're less suspicious that way. I'd go into Sheffield town centre because it's so busy. I'd go into clothes shops and stuff things in my bag or inside my jacket. I never got caught because I wasn't nervous, I guess because I didn't care. I was best at taking alcohol from supermarkets. I got away with huge bottles of Bacardi, which I would sell on or drink on my own. It seemed so easy I never got caught because I wasn't nervous, I guess because I didn't care.

7 Then, one day, a security guard from the supermarket followed me down the street. He waited until I took the bottle out of my jacket and that's when he caught me. They took me to the police station and put me in a cell. They took my phone off me, so I lost track of the time, I could have been inside three minutes or three hours. There were prostitutes and junkies in there and I thought: 'This could be me in four

years' time.' It left me thinking about what I'd done, and I realised I didn't want my life to turn out like that of the other women in the cell. Now I've enrolled in SCAPE, a youth programme for schools and I tell other teens my story, so they won't make the same mistake. I'm studying music and I'm going on a business studies course next year. I'm finally getting my education.'

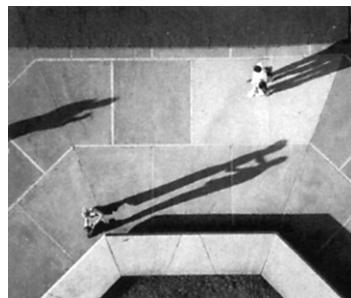

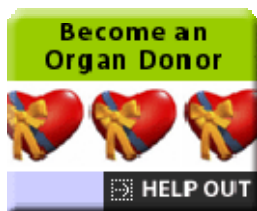

THE GIFT OF LIFE





THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE NEED A TRANSPLANT TO SAVE OR IMPROVE THEIR LIVES. WOULD YOU BACK A SYSTEM

THAT AUTOMATICALLY ALLOWS YOUR ORGANS TO BE DONATED AFTER YOUR DEATH?

- 1 The idea of donating organs is probably something most people don't like to give much thought. Who wants to think about what will happen to their body when they're gone? However, the shortage of organs has reached critical levels.
- 2 The shortage has forced some people to go abroad to buy organs on the black market. Last December police uncovered an organ trafficking gang, which involved buying organs from poor people in Brazil for \$10,000 and selling them for transplant in South Africa, for around \$120,000. Kidneys from live donors are also traded illegally. The reason for the crisis is simple: not enough people have registered to donate, according to Mr Chris Rudge, kidney transplant surgeon at The Royal London Hospital. 'There's always been a shortage, which is 21 because transplant surgery is so successful. We know that 90 per cent of people would be willing to donate. They just don't join the NHS Organ Donor Register.'
- 3 Another stumbling block is that when grieving relatives are approached about the prospect of donating the organs of their loved ones, they usually refuse. 'I don't know why relatives say no,' says Mr Rudge, 'I'm worried that there might be a lack of trust between patients and doctors.'
- 4 Scandals like the one involving Alder Hey children's hospital in Liverpool, where organs and skin tissues were removed from dead children without permission for research purposes, have certainly done little to reassure the public. The case of former footballer George Best's excessive drinking, after he had his liver transplant, certainly has not helped people to decide to donate either!
- 5 Perhaps it's a question of showing people what donation can mean. One person's death can save and improve the lives of more than ten other people. A heart transplant can save one life, and lung transplants save two more. The liver can be split, saving two more lives. Success rates are excellent: nine out of ten patients will lead healthy lives for years.
- 6 Deborah Duval, 44, received a new kidney and pancreas in 1994. She met the family of her donor, a 34-year-old man, who saved the lives of six people after his death. Her new kidney failed four years later, but she's now in good health after a second transplant. 'A phone call once again brought the dream of a life free from dialysis,' remembers Deborah. 'I owe my life to two families' extraordinary generosity and compassion.'
- 7 At present, even if you have chosen to donate your organs, your relatives can overrule you after your death. A new law is going through Parliament to change this, so that the wishes of the individual are decisive. We should ask ourselves, would we want a transplant if we were critically ill? If the answer's 'Yes' then surely we must be willing to do the same for others.

20,500 COMPLAINTS

COMPLAINTS about the BBC's decision to screen *Jerry Springer The Opera* have soared over 20,000.

Outraged viewers demanded the show — which contains 8,000 swear words — be banned from broadcast.

The BBC has received 15,000 complaints and 5,500 people contacted media regulator Ofcom — with thousands more jamming phone lines.

A spokesman said: "We've never before had so many complaints about a TV show that has not yet been broadcast."

The film of the hit West End show, about the cult US chat show host, includes the "F" word 3,168 times and the "C" word 297 times.

Furious viewer Julie Wildman, from Essex, said: "It's disgusting, I'm a Christian and find it highly offensive that this is going to be screened."

Jim Walsh, from Belfast, said: "*Jerry Springer the Opera* is a sick show that has no place on the BBC."

Gavin Upex, from Peterborough, said: "Do people really pay their license fee to receive a programme that contains 8,000 swear words? The BBC need to be pressured into realising how many people are against this programme."



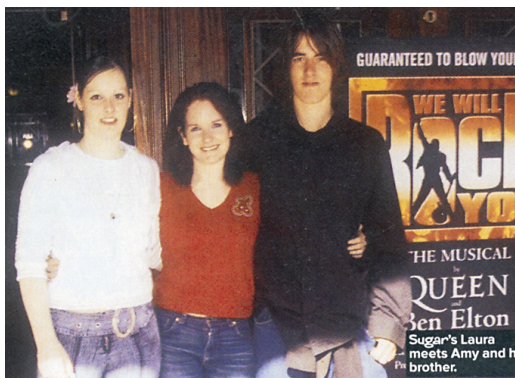

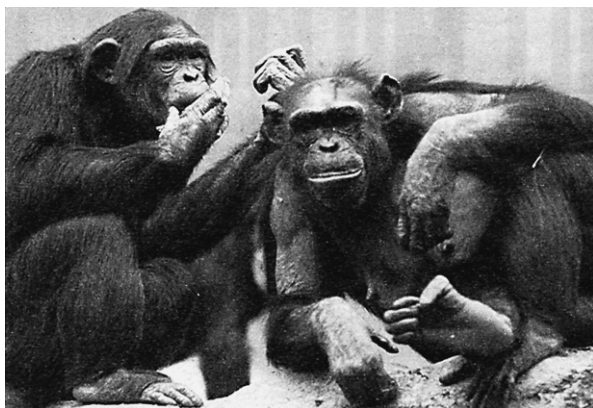
Then Dad was rushed off to do his punishment for being so embarrassing. I'd told the producer he is not much of a sportsman, so he was taken for a long workout!

"You often hear about chimps spitting or throwing things," says zoo behaviorist Steve Ross. "They do that to get a reaction from the public." The Zoo has now rigged up a hidden panel and when the apes touch it, the device shoots harmless bursts of air at visitors.

"The chimps were smart enough to figure out they could startle people with it," says curator of mammals Jennie McNary.

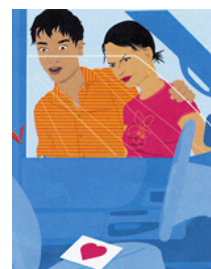

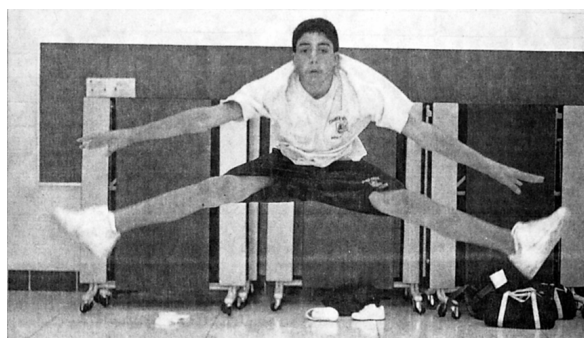
